

Citation at a glance | Article from a database (MLA)

To cite an article from a database in MLA style, include the following elements:

- 1 Author of article
- 2 Title of article
- 3 Title of periodical
- 4 Volume and issue numbers (for journal)
- 5 Date or year of publication
- 6 Page numbers of article (“n. pag.” if there are none)
- 7 Name of database
- 8 Medium
- 9 Date of access
